OCTOBER 1 RELEASE

130 birds were released for our last hunt. To date 60 birds have been harvested. If you have not called in or written your total taken to date, please do so.

Remember, we are under a self-imposed quota, so you can shoot only what you purchase. If you only purchase five, you can only shoot five. Some of you purchased three for the first period and have already harvested your quota. If you would like to purchase additional birds, we will be taking orders for the next releases. You may purchase additional birds up to six days prior to any release. Sorry, we cannot accept any additional orders after the six days prior to the release.

SAFETY

Please pay attention to the following so we can all have a safe hunt.

1. Do not shoot in the direction of other hunters, no matter how far away they are. If you can see them, they are too close for you to shoot in that direction.
2. Do not shoot within 300 feet of any home.
3. Do not shoot at a bird flying towards a residence.
4. All sporting clay shooting must be done from within the houses or boat. **DO NOT LOCATE YOUR OWN PLACES TO SHOOT!**
5. Please do not walk and hunt on the lawns of our neighbors.

**All of these above items have been recent problems so please use good judgment and common sense.

QUAIL

I have located quail at \$3.50 each so I will schedule a day or two to hunt them within the next few weeks, if we have some interest. Please let me know your thoughts on a date and the number of quail you would like to order.

COTTAGE

We rent our cottage out as well as using it ourselves. Please do not drive down there without checking with Paul, or Justine, first.

DECEMBER RELEASE

Several of you have asked about a release in December around Christmas week. December 22 is a Saturday and we could schedule a delivery then. Let me know your thoughts on how many birds you would like to order for this release.

SOYBEANS

Several of our members have been hunting in the soybeans. This crop is very fragile so please do not walk through these fields. If your dog runs in them occasionally that is ok, but it is not good to walk through them. The soybeans will be harvested shortly. Please stay out of these fields until then.

You can hunt in the sunflowers and the areas where the corn is planted in the soybeans. We hope to combine some of the corn soon to make it easier to hunt there.

Recently, there have been many people stopping on Highway 45 to see the Elk. Others have wanted to throw food scraps in to feed the elk. This is dangerous as the bull is quite protective of his harem and becomes very upset when people come too close. There is a safety concern for people close to the fence.

Bob and Janet have asked me to alert all of you to watch for this kind of problem. If you see anyone out of their vehicle, please approach them on behalf of the Black Wolf Wildlife Association and ask them to stay in their vehicles, as trespassers will be reported to the proper authorities.
